This narrative is filled with many great moments of historical information, personal dedication, revival experiences, family triumphs, and includes stories of humor, courage, and pathos. There is an account of the 1917 Pentecostal conference in Eureka Springs, Arkansas, of the Emanuel Church in Christ Jesus convention of 1927 in Guthrie, Oklahoma, and stories of R.E. Winsett, the songwriter and publisher; as well as a wealth of material about the life and ministry of Jerry Osborn. Many of the pictures of the persons and events that are included have never been published before!

Betty Treece is the wife of Rev. Marvin D. Treece, pastor of Apostolic Temple in Lake Charles, Louisiana. She is the mother of Paula Anderson of Houston, Texas, and of Rev. Ricky D. Treece of Lake Charles, Louisiana. As the wife of a noted pastor, teacher, and author, Betty Treece has been associated with preaching, teaching, and writing. It is evident to all who read her first full-length publication that she has captured the essence of successful communication.
