This document talks about Apostolic hermeneutics from a Christo-centric or Jesus Christ standpoint. It is so important. This is one of first things that I have seen. It allegorically talks about a door, and you should know the doors we go through. We may not realize it, but there are all kinds of doors. You need to look behind you; you're probably going to see a lot of different doors, and so we have to make sure that we go through the right door.

And so if I have misunderstandings or errors in my belief system, I want to know what they are. I'm not what they in the document refer to as a master-teacher or a master-student. That is a know-it-all that feels like there's nothing that he can ever learn. He knows it all. His way is the right way. It is my way or the highway. I don't feel that way; you know I am open to whatever the Word of God has to say to me, and I would recommend you listen to Brother Garza's document. This is the first, I hope, of many reviews.
