I want to have a student's mindset, always wanting to learn and educate myself with the Word of God. EAAH says, "A true student has a good attitude. His way of thinking is molded and guided by a teacher or a mentor. In contradistinction, someone that simply claims to be a student has a disposition that reflects a bad attitude. He cannot be molded or guided. One is a true student; the other is a nominal student—a student in name only."
