MATTHEW 22:42-WHAT THINK YE OF CHRIST?

In this passage is proposed an important question concerning an important character. A more extraordinary and interesting personage than the Lord Jesus Christ has never appeared on the earth, or enlisted the attention of men. Much is said of Him in the sacred scriptures, by Prophets, by Apostles, and Evangelists employed for the purpose. This we might naturally expect, since he is the substance of all the doctrines of grace, in whom all the promises are yea and amen. Our religious duty immediately respects him, and we are bound by gospel authority, particularly to know Him, to believe in His name, to trust in His righteousness, to rely on His grace, to submit to His will, and to look to Him as the author and finisher of faith.

Such being our obligations, it is rational to conclude that His true character is plainly revealed and clearly distinguished in the sacred volume. This, my hearers, has been open before you for inspection and examination....

I. We begin with His TITLES, especially those by which *real* Deity is plainly expressed. It cannot escape your notice that the terms, Lord, Ruler, King, Governor, and a variety

of others, which are not discriminating, are, in the scriptures, frequently applied both to the Father and the Son. But still, to distinguish underived Divinity, heaven has reserved appropriate titles.

God, is a name which designates Divinity of character; and is never applied to creatures, except in a sense evidently figurative. But Christ, the word, is in an emphatical manner, often stiled God. "And the word was with, and the word was God." – "Christ, who is God blessed forever." "In Him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily." "Great is the mystery of godliness; God was manifest in the flesh." And long before His appearance on earth, devine inspiration gave explicit direction to call Him by a name of this import. "And shall call His name Emmanuel." The interpretation is, God with us.

HIGHEST or MOST HIGH, is a title which denotes a charcter truly Divine. "The Lord thundered in the heavens, and the highest gave His voice." "The Highest shall establish her" (Zion.) This title is applied to the Savior. Zachariah, filled with the Holy Ghost, prophesied over his infant son and said, "Thou, child, shalt be called the

prophet of the Highest, for thou shalt go before the face of the Lord to prepare his ways." This child was evidently John, the Baptist, who by preparing the way, preaching repentance, and pointing out Christ as the Messias, was especially his prophet. And accordingly is called "the prophet of the Highest," (Christ.)

ALMIGHTY, is a title which plainly signifies supreme Diety. "Canst thou by searching find out God! Canst thou comprehend the Almighty unto perfection!" This the Lord Jesus applies to himself, in the revelation. "I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning, and the ending, saith the Lord, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty."

HERMENEUTICAL PRINCIPLES BY DENNIS GARZA

In the book of Matthew, Jesus came against an entire school of thought when He rebuked the Sadducees for their incorrect view regarding the resurrection. Jesus said, "Ye do err, not knowing the Scriptures, nor the power of God" (Mt.22:29). Though the Sadducees may have been well versed, they still did not "know" what the Scriptures clearly said: that there is a resurrection. In fact they were so confident and dogmatic in their belief system that they even created scenarios that were not based in reality (Mt.22:23-28).

This is a scary thought... that someone can be well versed, confident, yea, even dogmatic, and yet be doctrinally incorrect. That someone can read the Bible and still not "know" its meaning. Thus fulfilling the warning that Paul gave to Timothy: that some would be "Ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth" (2 Timothy 3:7).

Paul gives us an insight as to how and

why this can take place: "Now as Jannes and Jambres withstood Moses, so do these also resist the truth; men of corrupt minds..." (2 Timothy 3:8). The Sadducees clearly resisted truth. And they were corrupt. But somewhere, somehow, this false view on the resurrection became a viable school of thought. Maybe there was just enough truth mixed-in to make it plausible to those that embraced it. Supposition, theories and commentary as good as they may sound are simply conjecture until it has been clearly established as truth.

It has been said, that a lie told often enough becomes a truth in the minds of those that hear it. Maybe this doctrine was just an opinion at one time, and then it was repeated over and over again, and then people of influence continued to promote it until it became a force to contend with.

Today, there are still variant schools of thought, some more potentially dangerous than others. For example, some believe the Church has always existed since Pentecost. Others may believe that the Church died out and resurfaced as a byproduct of the Reformation. Which view is correct? Or is there another possibility? Whatever position you take, it is important to remember that in all probability, this can affect or jaundice the way you interpret the Bible—it's all tied together. Furthermore, consider the potential impact this could have on our overall worldview or mind-set.

So how do we protect ourselves from false doctrine or from errant schools of thought? The following principles offer us some insight:

(1) "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Timothy 2:15). We must be sure that our beliefs are founded solely on the Truth of scripture—a true student of the Word of God should not be intimidated with the prospect of conducting a thorough examination of their origin

and accuracy. Everything must be meticulously studied for oneself, regardless of the source or the emotional attachment one has to a particular belief.

- (2) "Prove all things..." (I Th.5:21). Basically, the safest thing to do when dealing with any given subject is to do a complete search on the topic involved. Some call this the "Complete Mention Principle." So instead of forming an opinion based on one or two selected verses, this principle will help us see the "complete picture" on any given subject.
- (3) "Unto the pure all things are pure: but unto them that are defiled and unbelieving is nothing pure; but even their mind and conscience is defiled" (Titus 1:15). The Sadducees had a different "world-view," or perspective—their view would not allow them to "see" the truth. Their carnal mindset produced carnal doctrines. Wasn't this the case with Rome? Wasn't this the case with Joseph Smith and Brigham Young? This is why it is so important to have a pure mind and a right spirit. Jesus said, "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God" (Matthew 5:3).

The subject of Bible interpretation is vast and far beyond the scope of this publication. These three principles are just a few examples of the way we arrive at Truth. Loyalty to a particular school of thought can lead us astray. Remember, we do not want to err; we want to *know* the scriptures and the power of God.

BABYLON MYSTERY RELIGION

One noted Roman Catholic writer, Alphonsus Liguori, wrote at length telling how much more effectual prayers are that are addressed to Mary rather than to Christ. (Liguori, incidently, was canonized as a "saint" by Pope Gregory XIV in 1839 and was declared a "doctor" of the Catholic church by Pope Pius IX.) In one portion of his writings, he described an imaginary scene in which a sinful man saw two ladders hanging from heaven. Mary was at the top of one; Jesus at the top of the other. When the sinner tried to climb the one ladder, he saw the angry face of Christ and fell defeated. But when he climbed Mary's ladder, he ascended easily and was openly welcomed by Mary who brought him to heaven and presented him to Christ! Then all was well. The story was supposed to show how much easier and more effective it is to go to Christ through Mary. The same writer said that the sinner who ventures to come directly to Christ may come with dread of his wrath. But if he will pray to the Virgin, she will only have to "show" that son "the breasts that gave him suck" and his wrath will be immediately appeased! Such reasoning is in direct conflict with scriptural example: "Blessed is the womb that bare thee," a woman said to Jesus, "and the paps that thou has sucked!" But Jesus answered, "Yea, rather blessed are they that hear the word of God and keep it" (Luke 11:27,28).

Your Relationship With Your Pastor

Several years ago a very wise man taught me a little saying. "A good understanding makes for long time friends." Very plain and frequent communication is needed between the assistant and his pastor.

The assistant must understand what is expected of him. It is a good idea to have a written contractual agreement and, as much as is possible, a job description. If you, as an assistant, do not understand exactly what is expected of you, ask. It is not the pastor's fault, it is yours. Communicate.

A full-time assistant should talk to the pastor at least once a day. It should take no longer than 3 or 4 minutes to fill him in on anything he should know. (Use your list.) The pastor should never be kept in the dark. There are some things he does not need to be bothered with, but if there is the least doubt, mention it and if he wants know more he can ask. You are another set of eyes and ears for the pastor. No one in the church should tell you anything that they do not want the pastor to know. You work for him. You are an extension of him. You are his eyes and ears, and if you think he should know you should tell him. If you are gathering information for him, type it clearly so he can use it readily. If he needs names, addresses, or phone numbers with the information, have them ready.

You should not tell him what you are going to do but ask him if it's okay with him. Remember, you are working with him and for him, he is the pastor and you must defer to his wishes.

Never, under any circumstances should a man speak negatively about his pastor to another minister. If you have a problem with something he is doing, talk to him. If it can't be talked about, keep your mouth shut.

Lastly, always remember that he is the pastor. You must defer to him. God does not speak to you about the church without speaking to the pastor. Never forget your place.

Your Relationship With Others

There are two ways in which a man may be put in the position of Assistant pastor. First, a man may be asked to move into the city specifically to assume the position. Second, he may be promoted to the position from his home congregation. The former is by far the easiest situation. The latter is more difficult so I will address it first.

When a man is raised from a young age in a particular assembly, or he comes into the church from the world, there is only one element that can cause him to gain respect in the eves of the people. That element is time. The saints have seen him fail. They have seen his mistakes. Perhaps some knew him as a little boy. Any of these circumstances will cause them to "look down" on him. Time and faithfulness are the only things that will gain their respect. Be kind, thoughtful, helpful, have a good spirit, work hard, and be patient. In time, things will unfold.
