William Penn

Another important Anti-Trinitarian Quaker is none other than the celebrated founder of Pennsylvania, William Penn. Penn wrote a book entitled <u>The Sandy Foundation Shaken</u> in which he denied the Trinity doctrine. For these statements he was accused of denying the divinity of Christ and imprisoned. From prison he wrote a brave answer to these charges entitled <u>Innocency With Her Open Face</u>. In this treatise he refers to the voice of wisdom in Proverbs:

"I wisdom lead the paths of judgment: I was set up from everlasting."

Penn alluded to the words of Paul in I Corinthians chapter one, in which he calls Jesus the power of God and the wisdom of God. He says:

"Christ who is the power and wisdom of God is not distinct from God, but entirely that very same God."

He boldly heralded:

"All these qualifications and divine properties are, by the concurrent testimonies of Scripture, ascribed to the Lord Jesus Christ; therefore, without a scruple, I call and believe to be the mighty God."

Later in the same book he appealed to his readers to judge whether:

"those persons who have been posting out their books against me [whilst a close prisoner] have not been beating the air and fighting against their own shadows."

Thank God for brave, true hearted, Jesus is God believers like the early Quakers and William Penn!
